Trident: 2016 is decision time!

- Parliament will vote in 2016 on whether to continue Trident patrols
- Main gate decision in 2016 on £31 billion of Trident contracts
- The International Court of Justice will rule in 2016 whether to hear case brought by the Marshall Islands against the UK for breach of Non-proliferation Treaty
- Political party and trade union branches across the UK debating Trident
- Party conferences in 2016 may vote to change policies on Trident
- 2016 elections to Scottish parliament may strengthen opposition to Trident in Scotland
- UN Working Group will report in 2016 on next steps towards a worldwide ban on all nuclear weapons

- Join in demonstrations and direct action at Burghfield atom bomb factory
- Support Young Friends cycling the route nuclear warheads take from Burghfield to Faslane and campaign to raise awareness along this route
- Take Trident to court via Trident Ploughshares 'PICAT' project

Talking about Trident

The people we are most likely to influence about Trident are those who are closest to us. Most people have not thought about this issue for decades, younger people may not yet have thought about it at all. You may be the only one who can talk about Trident to those who love and care about you. These conversations can be difficult, but they are where we can make our biggest contribution to stopping Trident.

Some pointers to having more productive Trident conversations are below. Try these out with friends and family, adapt them as you see fit, experiment! When you feel ready, try having Trident conversations with MPs or others who are not necessarily starting from a position of respect or willingness to listen. Do not expect people to be converted, but sometimes they may surprise you.

Ten Steps to having more productive Trident Conversations

1. **Prepare** – Do your homework before attempting a difficult conversation like this! You may know in your heart what is right, but to communicate with someone who disagrees we need to understand the arguments we are likely to encounter and be prepared for them.
2. **Open** – How to start a Trident conversation? Having a prop such as a leaflet, briefing or book might help. Perhaps you can refer to a recent news item or make a connection with something you know the other person cares about.
3. **Listen** – No matter how strongly we feel about an issue like this, the most important thing is to listen. No one will listen to you if you are not also listening to them – *really* listening so that they feel heard and you have actually understood where they are coming from.
4. **Affirm** – Listen out for things you can agree on and affirm these at the outset. If you cannot find any points of agreement, you can at least affirm their right to have an opinion on the subject and that their opinion is as valid as any other opinion.
5. **Clarify** and paraphrase – Don't assume they are merely toeing the party line that you have heard many times before. Listen out for nuances and points you can pick up on later. Reflect back to them what you are hearing so they can confirm that you have understood them correctly.
6. **Question** – The best result you can usually hope for in these conversations is to get people to question their own assumptions and beliefs. Where did they hear this or that? Does it sound right to them? Try to get them to think about facts versus opinions and how to do some fact-checking.
7. **Follow** arguments through to their logical conclusion – People often hold views about things which they have not fully thought through. We can help people think about what else must logically be true if what they are saying is true...
8. **Feed** – No one likes to admit we are wrong about something. New information allows us to re-think our existing views without being pushed into the corner of being 'wrong'. What new information can you give them?
9. **Explore** possible alternatives – As well as feeding in new information, we can help people explore ways of looking at something that they may never have thought about. This is a more creative approach and suits some people better than trying to rely on facts and figures.
10. **Summarise** – Ending a Trident conversation can be as difficult as starting one, especially if you still strongly disagree with each other. Is there anything you can now agree upon beyond what you might have identified in the 'affirming' stage (step 2)?

Write to your MP and local press

Most MPs take the views of Quakers seriously. Therefore it may be helpful for you mention that you are a Quaker or attend a Quaker Meeting when you write to your MP. Maybe you can get your local or area meeting to write the letter, or to agree a minute which you can include with your letter.

Letters to local newspapers can reach a surprisingly large number of people and are much easier to get printed than letters to national newspapers. You can also write something for a local newsletter or magazine produced by any group you are involved in to reach another audience. The more you write, the more people will hear the message. Apart from talking with people one-to-one, this is the most important way you can help stop Trident!

Join the Trident Letter-Writing Network

Some Friends have been involved previously with the 'Dialogue Project' or other letter-writing campaigns which tried to engage particular MPs or civil servants on the Trident issue. QPSW is reviving this idea in conjunction with Pax Christi, CND, Nuclear Information Service and Fellowship of Reconciliation. Each week, people in the network receive a short briefing with the latest news or developments relating to Trident and suggestions for what you might want to include in a letter to the editor or to a specific person.

Attend the national 'Stop Trident' demonstration in London on Saturday, 27 February

It is not often that we are all needed on the streets to make the biggest impact we possibly can on an issue like this. The 27th of February is one of those times! This demonstration is supported by Quakers in Britain, CND and more than 20 other organisations opposed to Trident. Come and march under the Quaker banner if you wish. We will be part of the 'No Faith in Trident' bloc, alongside Pax Christi, Methodists and other churches and faith groups. The march assembles at Marble Arch tube station at 12 noon and will end with speeches and music in Trafalgar Square.

Prior to the march, at 11am, there will be a brief interfaith service, incorporating some Quaker silent worship plus music and readings from other faiths, at Hine Street Methodist Church. We will then process from there to the assembly point for the start of the march at 12noon by Marble Arch tube station. For Friends arriving only at 12 and wanting to march under the Quaker banner, look out for the 'Quakers for Peace' banner!



Organise coaches and helping with the demonstration
